

Annual Meeting of the Association of Field Ornithologists September 13 through 15, 2001 · Cape May, New Jersey

Vou're invited to participate in the 2001 AFO meeting in Cape May, New Jersey. With help from friends and our local host, New Jersey Audubon's Cape May Bird Observatory (CMBO), we've arranged for two days of paper and poster sessions, banding demonstrations, a hawk banding workshop, field trips, and additional special events. Cape May, a quaint Victorian seaside resort, is two hours by car from Philadelphia, three and a half hours from New York City or Washington, D.C., and 45 minutes from Atlantic City. The closest airport is Pomona International Airport in Atlantic City.

Cape May will be the perfect location for a September meeting. It is a "hot spot" for fall migration because southward-bound birds funnel through New Jersey, hesitating at Cape May Point before crossing Delaware Bay. There will be numerous opportunities to visit local birding areas including the hawk monitoring site at Cape May Point State Park, the banding station, and more. A "Birding Attack Pack," prepared especially for AFO members by the Cape May Bird Observatory, will be presented to you upon arrival. It will include a complete list of activities, including free passes. You can also view a comprehensive schedule of Cape May birding events on the CMBO web site at http://www.njaudubon.com.

A special treat at this meeting will be a hawk banding workshop and hawk aging seminar, presented by Bill Clark and his colleagues from the Cape May Raptor Banding Project, Inc. After the banquet on Saturday, Scott Sutcliffe, AFO president elect, will present a lively presentation about 100 years of birds at the Cornell Lab of Ornithology.

The paper/poster sessions and general business meeting (open to members) will be held at the Grand Hotel, located on the beachfront

at Cape May. On Friday night, dinner will be held at the nearby Chalfonte Hotel, a comfortable Victorian inn, just around the corner from the Grand Hotel.

SPEAKERS

William S. Clark

Bill Clark is a photographer, author, and lecturer with over 30 years experience working with birds of prey, including five years as Director of National Wildlife Federation's Raptor Information Center. He has published numerous articles about raptors; has travelled extensively studying, observing, and photographing raptors; and has led raptor and birding tours and workshops, worldwide, with his company, Raptours. He regularly teaches courses on raptor field identification and biology.

Bill has written a raptor field guide for Europe, and is writing another for Africa, as well as a companion photographic guide. He and Brian Wheeler coauthored the *Photographic Guide to North American Raptors* and the completely revised Peterson guide, *Hawks*, will be released in November. For over 30 years, Bill has coordinated the Cape May Raptor Banding Project in New Jersey.

Scott Sutcliffe

Scott Sutcliffe is Associate Director of the Cornell Lab of Ornithology where he has spent 16 years assisting in the design and funding of Lab research, education, and conservation projects. Prior to joining the Cornell Lab of Ornithology, Scott directed a field office for The Nature Conservancy and before that he studied the nesting ecology of loons throughout much of New England. Scott received a BS from Cornell in 1975 and an MS from the University of New Hampshire in 1980, both in wildlife ecology.

His Saturday evening talk will touch on the Lab of Ornithology's role in the developing ornithological studies in the 20th century and will expand upon the exciting and innumerable opportunities for using the Web as a tool in bird monitoring and conservation efforts in the 21st century.

CALL FOR PAPERS

Submissions are welcome on any ornithological topic for presentation at the meeting, either orally (15-minute time slot) or as a poster. Please follow the instructions below for submitting an abstract. Invited speakers are also asked to submit an abstract. **Deadline for receipt of abstracts is August 3**. Send them to Erica Dunn, preferably by e-mail <Erica.Dunn@ec.gc.ca>, although regular mail is acceptable (Canadian Wildlife Service, National Wildlife Research Centre, 100 Gamelin Blvd., Hull, Quebec K1A 0H3). Any questions should be directed to Alicia Craig (<craiga@wbu.com>; telephone: 317–571–7100, ext. 121). Your abstract should not exceed 250 words in total, and should be in the format of the example shown below.

Skip a line after the abstract and then put in (1) the name and e-mail of the corresponding author (or other contact information, if no e-mail address), and (2) what kind of equipment you will need for your presentation. Slide, overhead, and computer image projectors will be provided, but please note that you must bring your own computer (for computer presentations), and any additional audio-visual equipment not listed here.

Example of abstract

Title of presentation (in bold text).

LASTNAME, FIRSTNAME, short address of author in italics, and LASTNAME2, FIRSTNAME2, short address of next author.

Start the text of the abstract indented, on a separate line. For multi-authored papers, put an asterisk at the end of the first name of the author who will be making the presentation (e.g. LASTNAME, FIRSTNAME*).
